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Cautionary Notes and Considerations for Readers

The following cautionary notes and considerations are provided to facilitate the interpretation and use of the data and information presented in this report.

Information in this document is provided for the purpose of providing a better understanding of the FNETB regional labour market landscape, based on the most current information available on the date of publication.

The figures shown in all Statistics Canada tables in the report have been subjected to a confidentiality procedure known as random rounding to prevent the possibility of associating statistical data with any identifiable individual. Under this method, all figures, including totals and detail, are randomly rounded, either up or down, to a multiple of "5" and in some cases "10". For example, random rounding of 12 to a multiple of 5 would yield either 10 or 15. Table cells, which contain data ranging between 0 and 9, are subjected to random rounding between 0 and 10. Therefore, a cell showing "0" could actually have a value of between 0 and 9. The random rounding technique is applied by Statistics Canada to protect against direct, residual or negative disclosure, without adding significant error to the census data.

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The information presented in this report is current at the time of printing.

Introduction

The mandate of the Far Northeast Training Board (FNETB) is to collect, analyze and disseminate local labour market information, to identify local labour force development needs and priorities, and to identify strategies and activities that are evidence-based, and that reflect the local labour market conditions and needs.

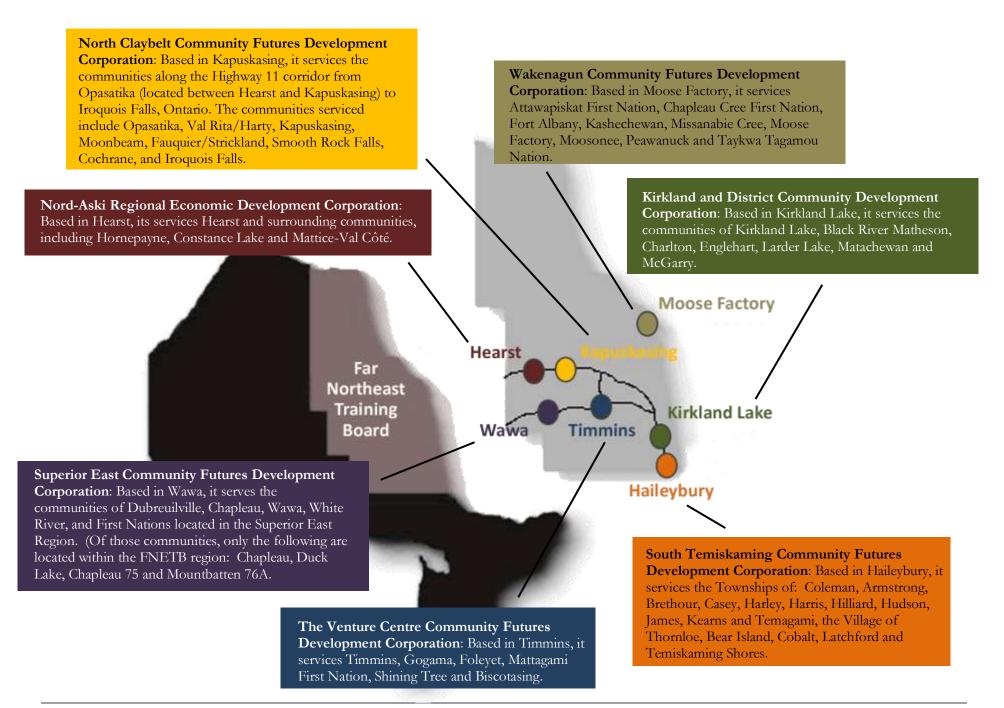
The current report, utilizing custom tabulations from Statistics Canada's 2016 Census, provides a forecast of labour market needs for the FNETB's service area for the period from 2016-2036. Similar reports were produced by the FNETB using data from the two previous Census periods (2006 and 2011).

The intent of this report is to provide the most up-to-date information possible in order to assist local stakeholders (educators and trainers, employment service providers, economic development and business organization, community and government leaders, etc) in their efforts to provide the programs and services to attract and retain the workers that are needed by local employers, and to prepare the future generation of workers.

FNETB Coverage Area

The region serviced by the FNETB includes the communities along the Highway 11 Corridor from Latchford to Hearst, east of Kirkland Lake it extends to the Quebec border. It also includes the communities along the James Bay Coast, as well as Timmins, Gogama, Chapleau, Elk Lake and Hornepayne. Since the area includes nearly 65 Census sub-divisions, the "community level" data and information has been grouped according to the Community Futures Development Corporations (CFDCs) boundaries, that operate within the FNETB Region. The CFDCs are administered by FedNor – the Federal Government's regional development program for Northern Ontario. The following CFDCs are located within the FNETB region:

- The Venture Centre Community Futures Development Corporation
- Superior East Community Futures Development Corporation (Chapleau)
- South Temiskaming Community Futures Development Corporation
- North Claybelt Community Futures Development Corporation
- Nord-Aski Regional Economic Development Corporation
- Kirkland and District Community Development Corporation, and
- Wakenagun Community Futures Development Corporation.



Overview of the Report

This report presents information on the percentage of the labour force throughout the FNETB Region in all occupations for five-year labour force cohorts, based on Statistics Canada Custom Data for 2011 and 2016. For purposes of this analysis, emphasis was placed on the 45+ years cohorts, to focus on the impact of projected retirements of the baby boom population -- born between 1946 to 1966 --- over the next 20 years and their replacement by the baby bust population that was born during the subsequent 20 years, from 1966 to 1986.

The report is designed to achieve the following goals:

- Show the age and occupational profile of workers in all sectors throughout the Far Northeast Training Board Region by Community Futures Development Corporation (CFDC) area; and
- Forecast occupations in which shortages in supply of workers are imminent over the next couple of decades, due to the aging of the labour force, based on custom Statistics Canada data.
- Present information on all National Occupational Classifications (NOCs) with more than 20 incumbents, in which more than 50% are projected to retire over the next 20 years, for each of the Community Futures Development Corporation areas, by five-year age cohorts from 15 to 65+ years.
- Estimate labour force demand in each CFDC Area, based on projected retirements, using the age profile of the population's workforce, based on an average retirement age of 62 years.¹
- Present data on occupations that could experience retirement of 30% or more of their incumbents over the next 20 years.

Methodology

Following appointment, Lawlor & Associates contacted Statistics Canada to obtain customized 2016 census data on occupational breakdowns for all occupations within the FNETB region, by Community Futures Development Corporation (CFDC) areas. In addition to obtaining data on the total number of people in each occupation for each CFDC area throughout the FNETB Region, information was acquired on how many of them were in five-year age cohorts from 15 to 65+. Age data was obtained on all National Occupational Classification (NOC) positions for each of the CFDC areas. In each case, it was possible to determine how many people in each CFDC area were in each occupation and in each five-year age cohort in 2016.

¹ In 2011, Statistics Canada reported that the median age at retirement for men was 63.2, while for women it was 61.4 years. However, our data for the FNETB Region indicates that in a large number of the occupations, few people stay in the labour force after the age of 60. For the purposes of this report, we have taken the average of Statistics Canada retirement age for men and women, which would be 62.3 years. We have rounded this to 62 years throughout the report.

Using this data, it was possible to project labour force attrition patterns for every occupation that had 20 or more occupants in 2016, by occupation, over a 20-year period, in which 30% or more of the current population will retire between 2016 and 2036.

Statistics Canada Data Analysis²

Utilizing Statistics Canada custom data, it was possible to determine the percentage of the labour force throughout the FNETB Region, in all occupations, that was 15 - 24 years, 25 - 44 years, 45 - 64 years and 65 + years. Table 1 presents data for 2011 and for 2016, as well as the percentage difference that occurred over the five-year period between 2011 and 2016.

Tables 1 provides the following insights, based on the 2016 census data:

- For Venture Centre, there were 9,710 members in the 45 64 age cohort. The total of 9,395 members of the 25 44 age cohort over the 20-year period from 2016 to 2036, suggests a moderate balance, since the shortfall is only 3.4%.
- For Superior East, there were 1,730 members in the 45 64 age cohort. The total of 1,450 members of the 25 44 age cohort over the 20-year period from 2016 to 2036, indicates a shortfall of 19.3%.
- For South Temiskaming, there were 4,170 members in the 45 64 age cohort. The total of 3,365 members of the 25 44 age cohort over the 20-year period from 2016 to 2036, indicates a shortfall of 23.9%.
- For North Claybelt, there were 5,300 members in the 45 64 age cohort. The total of 4,090 members of the 25 44 age cohort over the 20-year period from 2016 to 2036, indicates a shortfall of 29.6%.
- For Nord-Aski, there were 2,095 members in the 45 64 age cohort. The total of 1,525 members of the 25 44 age cohort over the 20-year period from 2016 to 2036, indicates a shortfall of 37.4%.
- For Kirkland Lake District, there were 3,845 members in the 45 64 age cohort. The total of 3,140 members of the 25 44 age cohort over the 20-year period from 2016 to 2036, indicate a shortfall of 22.5%.
- For Wakenagun, there were 825 members in the 45 64 age cohort. The total of 1,375 members of the 25 44 age cohort over the 20-year period from 2016 to 2036, suggests a surplus of 40.0%.

² This custom data, which was provided by Statistics Canada, is based on the Statistics Canada Household Survey, which is weighted to reflect the entire population of the region. Numbers in various tables do not always add to totality (100%), due to rounding of data. This is especially apparent when dealing with small numbers.

- Throughout the FNETB Region, this means that there were 27,675 members in the 45 64 age cohort. The total number of 24,340 members of the 25 44 age cohort³ over the 20 years from 2016 to 2036, indicates a shortfall of 13.7% for the FNETB Region.⁴
- Table 1 also highlights:
 - o an increase in the percentage of the 65+ population in the labour force over the period from 2011 to 2016.
 - o changes in the size of the three grouped cohorts from 15-24, 25-44 and 45-64 over the five-year period from 2011 to 2016.

For purposes of the current analysis, the breaking points identified above were selected to focus on the impact of the retirement of the baby boom generation that was between the ages of 45 - 64 years in 2016 over the period from 2016 - 2036, and their replacement by those in the next four younger, five-year age cohorts from 25 - 44 years.

³ With the exception of Wakenagun and Venture Centre, the number of members of the 25 – 44 age cohort is much smaller than the number of people in 45 – 64 age cohorts. As a result of the baby boom factor, this presents unique challenges, as older people retire and smaller numbers of younger people are available to replace them. This is further exacerbated by the fact that younger people are migrating from various CFDC Areas to pursue educational and employment opportunities. As well, it should be noted that there is limited migration into the area from both domestic and international sources.

⁴ Caution should be used in interpreting this depiction for the region, since the surplus in Wakenagun and the fact that Venture Centre is almost balanced, leads to an understatement of the actual shortage for the other areas throughout the FNETB Region. When Venture Centre and Wakenagun are removed from the calculations, the projected shortage for the remainder of the FNETB Region is 26.3%.

Regional Analysis by CFDC Area

Next it is appropriate to highlight occupations with 20 or more incumbents in which 50% or more were 45+ years in 2016, and identify their exit patterns from various occupations, by CFDC Area, over the next 20 years.



Data for the Venture Centre Community Futures Development Corporation's area may be summarized as follows:

- For all occupations, a total of 4,255 workers from 55 64 years old are projected to exit the labour force from 2016 2026, while an additional 5,455 workers from 45 54 years old are projected to exit over the period from 2026 2036, for a total of 9,710 possible exits over this 20-year period.
- This is a slightly unfavourable balance between older and younger age cohorts, since the number of persons in the 45+ cohort, who could be retiring (9,710) over the next 20 years, slightly exceeds the number in the 25 44 age cohorts (9,395), who will be available to replace them, reflecting a moderate shortfall of 3.2%.
- Based on this assessment, there appears to be a reasonable balance between those who will be retiring over the 20-year period from 2016 to 2036 and those in the younger age cohorts.
- The following table provides details on specific occupations, where issues are apparent.

In reviewing the following table, readers should take note of the highlighted (45+) column. This column represents the percentage of the labour force for each occupation with more than 20 incumbents in the Venture Centre CFDC Area, who are projected to retire from the labour force over the next 20 years, starting in 2016.

SUPERIOR EAST/SUPÉRIEUR EST Community Futures Development Corporation Société d'aide au développement des collectivités

Data for the Superior East Community Futures Development Corporation's area may be summarized as follows:

- For all occupations, a total of 860 workers from 55 64 years old are projected to exit the labour force from 2016 2026, while an additional 870 workers from 45 54 years old are projected to exit over the period from 2026 2036, for a total of 1,730 possible exits over this 20-year period.
- This represents an unfavourable balance between older and younger age cohorts, since the number of persons in the 45+ cohort, who could be retiring (1,730) over the next 20 years, exceeds the number in the 25 44 age cohorts (1,450), who will be available to replace them, reflecting a shortfall of 16.2%.
- This is a matter that needs to be addressed, if it is assumed that it is desirable to maintain current labour force levels over the next 20-year period.
- The following table provides details on specific occupations, where issues are apparent.

In reviewing the following table, readers should take note of the highlighted (45+ years) column. This column represents the percentage of the labour force for each occupation with more than 20 incumbents in the Superior East CFDC Area, who are projected to retire from the labour force over the next 20 years, starting in 2016.

⁷ It is important to note that only Chapleau, Chapleau 75 First Nation, Mountbatten 76A First Nation and Duck Lake First Nation, which constitute only a portion of Superior East CFDC Area, are located within the FNETB Region.

Data for the South Temiskaming Community Futures Development Corporation's area may be summarized as follows:

- For all occupations, a total of 2,100 workers from 55 64 years old are projected to exit the labour force from 2016 2026, while an additional 2,070 workers from 45 54 years old are projected to exit over the period from 2026 2036, for a total of 4,170 possible exits over this 20-year period.
- This represents an unfavourable balance between older and younger age cohorts, since the number of persons in the 45+ cohort, who could be retiring (4,170) over the next 20 years, exceeds the number in the 25 44 year cohorts (3,365), who will be available to replace them, reflecting a shortfall of 19.3%.
- This is a matter that needs to be addressed, if it is assumed that it is desirable to maintain current labour force levels over the next 20-year period.

- For all occupations, a total of 365 workers from 55 64 years old are projected to exit the labour force from 2016 2026, while an additional 670 workers from 45 54 years old are projected to exit over the period from 2026 2036, for a total of 1,035 possible exits over this 20-year period.
- This represents a very favourable balance between older and younger age cohorts, since the number of persons in the 45+ cohort, who could be retiring (1,035) over the next 20 years, is much lower than the number in the 25 44 age cohorts (1,505), who will be available to replace them, reflecting a surplus of 45.4%. The young age profile of the Wakenagun population explains this significant difference from conditions prevailing in most of the other CFDC areas throughout the FNETB Region.

Note to reader on labour force demand projections (2016-2036)

The projected Occupational Demand Tables that follow were developed, using Statistics Canada 2016 census information, to provide an indication of the occupations that will experience highest levels of attrition, due to age-based retirement, in various CFDC areas, by five-year increments over the next twenty years, based on custom data provided to the Far Northeast Training Board by Statistics Canada. The entries have been culled to include only NOC categories that are projected to lose more than 30% of their occupants over the period from 2016 to 2036.
