The Temiskaming District continues to face a net-migration in all age cohorts.

A look at the origin (the districts that in-migrants come from) and the destination of out-migrants (the districts where they go to), the data seems to reveal a high rate of migration in and out of the of other Northern Ontario districts. At the time of the 2016 Census, **28.5%** of the total population 15 and over in Kirkland Lake had no certificate, diploma or degree compared to **17.5%** in Ontario.



Certificate or Diploma

The percentage of the population in Kirkland Lake with a University Certificate, Diploma or Degree was significantly lower than the province.

The percentage of the population in Kirkland Lake with an Apprenticeship or Trades Certificate or Diploma exceeds that of the province.

Kirkland Lake has a higher percentage of population with a College, CEGEP or other non-university Certificate or Diploma compared to the district and the province.

Between 2006 and 2016, the educational attainment levels of the population aged 15 and over improved overall.



During that same period, it is important to note the decrease in the percentage of the population aged 25 and over with an Apprenticeship or Trades certificate or diploma.

At the time of the 2016 Census, overall participation rates in Kirkland Lake were similar to those of the province, with two notable exceptions:

- Participation rates for the 15 to 24 age cohort were higher in Kirkland Lake compared to the province.
- Cohorts in the 55+ categories had lower participation rates than the province.

The table below clearly demonstrates the correlation between higher education and employment outcomes.


